Dr. Carol Falender (B.A. Vassar College; M.A., Ph.D., University of Wisconsin, Madison) is a lecturer, clinical supervisor, and teacher. She is Clinical Professor in the Department of Psychology at UCLA, an Adjunct Professor at Pepperdine University, and maintains an independent practice in Santa Monica, California. She is the author of numerous professional articles on the subject of supervision and her books, *Clinical* Supervision: A Competency Based Approach (2004, APA Books, coauthored with Edward Shafranske) and Casebook for Clinical Supervision: A Competency-based Approach (2004, APA Books, coedited with Edward Shafranske), have become standard resources for supervisory competence. Dr. Falender has lectured in North America and internationally about supervision, supervision ethics, and best practices in training, and on a range of child and adolescent treatment topics. She is active in the California Psychological Association as Chair of the Continuing Education Committee Board and member of the Los Angeles County Psychological Association Ethics Committee. She is a former President of APA's Division 37, Society for Child and Family Policy and Practice.

or generations, clinical supervision has stood at the centre of training for psychologists and other mental health professionals, and regulators have specified in careful detail the amount and nature of supervised professional experience required for entry into the various professions. However, until recently, regulators have been more or less silent about standards for the work of supervisors. Supervisors, responsible for mentoring, educating, and evaluating supervisees, while keeping the well-being of patients or clients in the front of their minds, have often had little actual education or training in supervision, and little framework and few guidelines to work from.

Fortunately, times are changing. Contemporary mental health practitioners have access to a large body of theory and research tailored to their specific needs as Supervisors. In 2008, the Canadian Psychological Association released Draft Ethical Guidelines for Supervision in Psychology, which recognized supervision as a specialized area of psychological activity with its own foundation of knowledge and skills enhanced by education and training. These draft guidelines noted that education and training in supervision has too often been minimal or absent from psychologists' professional preparation, but that supervisors now have an ethical responsibility to pursue specific education and training in supervision. Currently, California is the only North American Psychology regulatory jurisdiction to mandate that Psychologists who supervise receive specific

training in supervision every licensure period, but some allied professions—for example, the American Association for Marriage and Family Therapy—have more broadly-based guidelines for supervisors.

In this one-day workshop, Dr. Carol Falender will introduce participants to her highly respected and cutting edge approach to Clinical Supervision. Dr. Falender will introduce workshop participants to competency-based supervision, a scienceinformed process of delineating the competencies required for good practice, and of identifying and developing specific competencies in both trainees and their supervisors. Her framework will help both new and seasoned supervisors to enrich and update their present supervision by thoughtfully integrating tools and competency measures developed by leading contemporary researchers into a robust supervision contract.

With expert commentary, helpful audio-visual materials, and excerpts from actual supervisory sessions. Dr. Falender will examine the supervisory relationship in detail and help supervisors to inform their work with research on best practices in supervision. Dr. Falender will extend from theory and research to discussion and experiential exercises around key issues in successful supervision. Fostering a strong supervisory alliance, managing counter-transference and parallel process, differentiating supervision from psychotherapy are areas Dr. Falender will target, as are building competency around diversity, gate-keeping, legal, ethical, and liability issues and risk management, and dealing with supervisees who don't progress toward competence.
